

INFORMATION AND NOTES FOR RECIPIENTS (form AVE EDAN1)

THIS DANGER NOTIFICATION IS AN IMPORTANT DOCUMENT REQUIRING IMMEDIATE ATTENTION.

IF YOU ARE NOT A PERSON HAVING RESPONSIBILITY FOR THE SAFETY OF THE ELECTRICAL INSTALLATION OR EQUIPMENT CONCERNED, IT IS IMPORTANT THAT YOU PASS THIS NOTIFICATION TO SUCH A PERSON WITHOUT DELAY.

This Notification has been issued to notify potentially dangerous condition(s) within the existing electrical installation to which it relates. The Notification has been issued to conform to the standards laid down in BS 7671 : 2001 (2004) – Requirements for Electrical Installations, IEE Wiring Regulations.

You should have received the *original* Notification and the contractor will have retained a *duplicate* copy. The Notification consists of one page and must include a printed three-digit serial number, e.g. AVE123. Only a contractor with Aquae Vitae Electrical is authorised to issue this Electrical Danger Notification.

The NICEIC Registered contractor issuing this Electrical Danger Notification has found that a part or parts of the electrical installation identified overleaf is/are in a potentially dangerous condition. The safety of those using the installation may be at risk.

The further urgent action recommended needs to be taken immediately to remove the danger.

Urgent remedial work is also necessary to bring the installation up to the standard required by the current issue of the national standard for the safety of electrical installations, British Standard 7671 : 2001 (2004) – Requirements for Electrical Installations, IEE Wiring Regulations, and the Health & Safety Electricity at Work Regulations 1989. The contractor issuing this Notification will be able to provide further advice.

Regulation 4(1) of the Electricity at Work Regulations 1989 requires that all systems shall at all times be of such construction as to prevent, so far as is reasonably practicable, danger. Regulation 4(2) requires all systems to be maintained so as to prevent, so far as is reasonably practicable, such danger. In places where work activities are undertaken such as employing contractors, failure to comply with the Electricity at Work Regulations could result in prosecution.

The *original* Notification should be retained in a safe place and shown to any person inspecting or undertaking further work on the electrical installation. If you later vacate the property, this Notification will demonstrate to the new owner or user the status of the installation or part of the installation identified in the Notification at the 'date observed' recorded on this Notification.

Should a person having responsibility for the safety of the electrical installation have reason to believe that the issue of this Electrical Danger Notification does not reasonably reflect the status of the electrical installation, the person should in the first instance raise the specific concerns in writing with the Electrical Contractor. If the concerns remain unresolved, the client may make a formal complaint to the NICEIC, for which purpose a standard complaint form is available on request.

The complaints procedure offered by the NICEIC is subject to certain terms and conditions, full details of which are available upon application (or visit www.niceic.org.uk). The NICEIC does not investigate complaints relating to the operational performance of electrical installations (such as lighting levels), or to contractual or commercial issues (such as time or cost).

Our Electrical Contractors have been assessed as having the technical capability to carry out electrical work to conform to the standards laid down in BS 7671 : 2001 (2004) – Requirements for Electrical Installations, IEE Wiring Regulations, and all electrical installation work carried out by them is required to conform to those standards.
